PRESIDENT'S REPORT

There are many times that I have been inspired by the power of community, but never more so than over the past two years. Through 2020 and 2021, the world faced the full burden of the COVID-19 pandemic which served not only to highlight but also to heighten many of the complex challenges that people living with disabilities face every day. Yet in true Camp He Ho Ha spirit, our community and campers continued to come together to support one another.

Camp He Ho Ha remained committed to the mission of providing recreational opportunities to children and adults with physical and mental disabilities. Free virtual camps ran for a second year throughout 2021, bringing the joy of Camp to people with disabilities while keeping everyone safe.

Summer camp was not the only program to move to a virtual platform. All in-person fundraising events were held online. Camp introduced a new virtual fundraiser the 'Move, Groove & Improve campaign.' This campaign raised money while inspiring campers, and the rest of us, to deal with the social isolation, health concerns, and inactivity of lock-down. Although some individual fundraising participants made a significant impact, Camp's ability to fundraise was hindered by the pandemic as well as a lack of confidence for in-person events. We all look forward to the days when we can return to the in-person events and can connect with our donors and community again.

Due to health and safety restrictions, facility rentals were suspended for most of 2021. However, following seventeen consecutive months of vacancy, the facility rentals program resumed operation in the fall with great celebration! Rental guests were grateful to be back on site to enjoy Camp's incredible facility. We are excited for the return of our large and long-standing rental group partners, and the significant revenue their visits bring.

Even though Camp's fundraising and operations were dramatically scaled back, Camp ended the year with an operating surplus of \$101K. In 2021 Camp practiced good financial stewardship by keeping expenses low and increasing the funds available to reinvest into adapted programs for people with special needs by 6% over 2020. The Camp holds healthy cash reserves and is well-positioned to continue operations in the future.

Despite the year's challenges, there is no denying Camp's commitment to people living with disabilities and the support and commitment of many talented people. High praise belongs to Executive Director Greg Nielsen for his devotion; he made many tough decisions and sacrifices to ensure Camp will be here long after the pandemic. Thank you to Camp's staff, all of whom worked reduced hours or were laid off during 2020/2021. Your unwavering commitment, hard work, and flexibility keep the spirit of Camp going. Sincere gratitude to my fellow board members for your vision and expertise to guide the organization through challenges, changes, and successes. Thank you to our donors. Your continued encouragement, enthusiasm, and generosity are crucial to the ongoing success of Camp. Without your support, we would not have accomplished what we have in the past or be able to accomplish the important things we have planned. Finally, thank you to our campers, we cannot wait to see you again! We miss you, and we will be here to welcome you back to your home-away-fromhome soon!

PROGRAMS REPORT

Still in the depths of Covid-19 uncertainty, the summer camp season of 2021 was a non-starter. The uncertainties of health restrictions and isolation protocols were too much to safely operate summer camp programs for another season.

In a traditional season, Camp operates different 10 camps servicing over 750 people with disabilities facilitated by 35 care-providing summer staff. We were unable to guarantee 100% prevention and transmission of an airborne illness and therefore the risk of safely running programs was too great of a risk. Especially, for a group of individuals that often have additional medical complications. Though our hearts yearned for in-person fun and wonderful hugs with our friends, we all had to settle in for another summer of doing things virtually.

Throughout 2021, our campers enjoyed the virtual summer camps that were hosted at least twice per month from January to December. During the summer months, the virtual camps were hosted every week! We created origami, had in-home treasure hunts, planted gardens, performed a live

virtual concert featuring our campers (also called skit night), and shared stories just to name a few of our fun adventures. Our attendance for the 2021 virtual camp programs was over 1300 people! While nothing can really compare to the full Camp He Ho Ha experience on our 107-acre paradise, we turned up the creativity and danced our hearts out as close to Camp as we could get.



EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

2021 certainly provided moments of uncertainty, frustration, clarity, and growth. The various moments have offered daily reminders that the world is changing, and Camp Health, Hope & Happiness on Lake Isle must pivot in ways to parallel the changes around us. This will undeniably ensure Camp He Ho Ha is better able to support Albertans with special needs for years to come.

As a result of the ongoing restrictions we encountered in 2021, many aspects of our operations were suspended or modified to best accommodate our camp communities. Our rental revenues were drastically reduced because of groups choosing not to visit our facility, and for those groups attending the number of attendees was typically reduced. Our in-person fundraising efforts were reduced to online versions to generate funds; thank you to those who supported our online events in 2021. Summer programs for Albertans with special needs were once again cancelled for the second consecutive year because of Alberta overnight summer camp restrictions related to Covid-19.

The reduced business in 2021 had Camp Health, Hope & Happiness on Lake Isle working hard to minimize expenditures to mirror the reduced revenues. Unfortunately, this cost-cutting manifested in many different forms, and one included a human factor. Reduced operations forced the majority of the Camp He Ho Ha team to work reduced hours while we waited for things to begin to return to normal. As well, facility operations were analyzed and many systems around the camp were shut down or their operations modified to reduce operational costs.

With our facility empty because of restrictions, we worked hard to stay connected with our camper community by offering online Zoom programs throughout the calendar year. Although these meetings could not replace a summer camp experience they allowed campers to enjoy camp activities, engage with fellow campers, and have their questions answered about Camp He Ho Ha and its future.

As we look forward, we are optimistic there will be brighter times ahead and soon our campers will be returning to Camp Health, Hope & Happiness on Lake Isle for an adventure of a lifetime.

In closing, I would like to thank our resolute staff team, board members, volunteers, donors, and campers along with their families for their assistance over the past year. We are grateful for the unwavering support as we continue our legacy of providing barrier-free services to the growing community of Albertans living with disabilities.

CHILDREN'S ABILITY FUND'S LONG-TERM SUPPORT

In 2019, the Children's Ability Fund, donated \$250,000 as a 10year commitment to Camp He Ho Ha. Every year for ten years, \$25,000 is designated to support summer camps for individuals with special needs, and in particular, programs for children and teens with physical disabilities. This incredible commitment continues to make a substantial difference each year.

FACILITY REPORT

When we reflect back on the past few years there is no denying circumstances have been difficult for everyone, including Camp He Ho Ha and the facility rental program. Provincial health and safety restrictions and the uncertainty of Covid-19 affected on the world around us have certainly taken their toll. Despite all these challenges, Camp He Ho Ha was able to reopen the facility rentals program in the fall of 2021. In September, October, and November of 2021 Camp hosted just shy of 150 rental guests which added approximately \$42,000 in revenue.

Due to the quality of our facility and service the rentals program continues to attract and retain long-term customers. Every month Camp continues to receive many calls and emails from interested groups wanting to return to "normal" with a visit to Camp He Ho Ha. With the easing of restrictions and increased confidence from rental groups, we are confident that we will return t another successful rental season in 2022.

As always, customer service is the main objective of our rentals program. Camp's main goals are to ensure all guests are well taken care of and that they feel safe, comfortable, and that homeaway-from-home relaxation. If and when they arise, all issues and concerns are taken seriously and addressed as quickly as possible. More often though, rave reviews and compliments are graciously accepted and relayed to the appropriate staff.

Regardless of the length of the stay, or the number of people attending, the Camp He Ho Ha team works hard to ensure each guest is made to feel special and that the doors to Camp Health, Hope & Happiness are always held wide open to friends, both old and new.

FACILITY FEEDBACK

I have so many fond memories of the Alberta Society of Fiddlers Winter Retreat at Camp Health, Hope and Happiness. The event has created lots of great music and is loved by all the folks who participate. The friendships and fellowship that have been created are overwhelming.

These experiences would not be possible without facilities like Camp He Ho Ha and the wonderful Camp staff that are so easy to work with. The accommodations, meeting rooms, rec hall, swimming pool, and dining hall are all top-notch. The chef and kitchen staff have always gone above and beyond to provide us with meals similar to what you might experience at a Caribbean resort. So many choices, healthy and filling, while also making concessions for people with dietary concerns.

I can sum it all up with a few words: "Camp is such a good and fair bang for your buck!" So, speaking for my whole group, in the words of Arnold Schwarzenneger, "WE'LL BE BACK!!"





FUNDRAISING REPORT

2021 fundraising efforts could be characterized as conservative maintenance. Although Camp sought funding from many sources, the suspension of in-person camps made us less attractive to grant and fundraising donors. Despite this roadblock, Camp He Ho Ha was awarded nine grants valued at \$58,994 to support water treatment plant upgrades, new technology, facility overhead, maintenance equipment, and other needs at Camp.

Due to continued uncertainties and health restrictions, Camp ran three virtual fundraising events: the Shoot For Cause Archery Fundraiser, the Swing FORE Camp Golf Fundraiser, and the new Move, Groove, and Improve Fitness Fundraiser. Together these events had only modest success in comparison to their in-person counterparts. We look forward to resuming in-person events post-pandemic.

The annual campaign raised \$64,603 to support summer camps for children and adults with disabilities, and keep Camp He Ho Ha open for when campers finally return to the facility on the shores of Lake Isle.


